
Distribution

If gluten-free wafers are required for health reasons, then please ask the pastor serving communion for a wafer.



Holy Communion: Tree of Life Setting





Women's Bible Study

THE BOOK of JOB

AKA: Job and his terrible, horrible, no good, very bad days!

First and third Wednesdays of each month at 11:30 a.m. in the MVLC Library.

Background.

Author unknown. Likely Jewish, sixth century BC.

Focus.

A good, innocent man of faith suffers devastating loss. Three friends come to comfort him and offer reasons. Job dares God alone to give him answers.

Central Questions.

Why do the innocent suffer? Where is God in my suffering? Why is the world this way?

Lutheran Study Bible summary.

The Book of Job is a profound meditation on the mystery of suffering. It invites new questions and new interpretations [and new responses] from every generation of readers. Most importantly, it invites us into an encounter with God, the God of life who created and sustains the world in love and who, through the cross of Christ, enters fully into the suffering of that world and redeems it.
