




Glory to you, O Lord.



Open Wafer



Lutheran Christians are taught that faith in Jesus Christ invites our engagement in the world rather than drawing us away from our responsibilities to each neighbor. In foundational writings (*The Augsburg* Confession and *The Apology/Defense of the Augsburg Confession*), Martin Luther and Philip Melanchthon addressed public order and secular government in Article XVI:

It is taught (among us) that political authority, orderly government, laws and good order in the world are created and instituted by God and that Christians may without sin exercise political authority...that it is permissible for a Christian to hold public office, render verdicts on the basis of established laws, to prescribe just punishments, engage in just wars, serve in the military, enter into legal contracts, own property, take oaths when required, contract marriage. In short, we confess that legitimate civil ordinances are good creations of God and divine ordinances in which a Christian may safely take part...Christ's kingdom permits us to make outward use of legitimate political ordinances of whatever nation in which we live...

In short, we are to participate fully in the civil realm of life in the community, nation and world. In our nation, one essential response is to listen, weigh, evaluate, and then chose, vote for political candidates that uphold God's vision of justice, mercy, compassion, welcome, inclusion of the foreigner as having the full rights of citizens, as well as the provision and protection of the most vulnerable among us.

To fail to vote for such leadership is a betrayal of responsibility, a diminishment of faith, and a denial of Jesus's call to love and serve our neighbor.

Theologian Frederick Buechner in his book *Whistling in the Dark*, **in 1988**, writes this about his entry on the term 'politics':

You can't help but wondering what would happen if a person running for the presidency—decided to set politics in the sense of flag-waving, tub-thumping, axe-grinding and the like aside and to speak instead candidly, thoughtfully, truthfully out of his or her heart. Suppose a candidate were to stand up before the reporters and TV cameras and the usual bank of microphones and say something like this:

"The responsibilities of this office are so staggering that anybody who doesn't approach them with knees knocking is either a fool or a lunatic. The literal survival of civilization may depend on the decisions either I or the other candidate make during the next four years. The general welfare and peace of mind of millions of people will certainly depend on them. I am only a human being. If I have my strengths, I also have my weaknesses. I can't promise that I'll always do the right thing for this country. I can only promise that it will always be this country rather than my own political fortunes that I'll try to do the right thing for. I believe in this country at its best...[and] I can't help believing that there are others who would find it such a note of sanity, honesty and hope in the political quagmire that they would follow the person who made such a statement to the ends of the earth."

This is still true more than three decades later. Remember to vote.

Pastors Bri, Mike, and Kim will be leading a seven-week study series on *The Freedom of a Christian*, an essential treatise written by Martin Luther. The study has been offered to churches as part of the ELCA's celebration of the treatise's 500 year publication anniversary. It's one key part of Luther's major theological writings.

(You will want to download the treatise ahead of time so that you can begin wrestling with this powerful teaching. The download includes the treatise as well as the letter Luther wrote to Pope Leo X in an attempt to explain and defend his theological perspective on the gospel of Jesus Christ.)

A key moment occurs in the treatise as Luther addresses this paradox:

The Christian person is a completely free lord of all, subject to none.

The Christian person is a completely dutiful servant of all, subject to all.

Luther says of his treatise on Christian freedom, that it contains a summary of the whole Christian life, if you understand its meaning. Please join us for an extended conversation on this essential writing.
