

In the order of service, the words that are spoken by a leader are in regular type.

Words spoken by the assembly are in boldface type.

For music, the words will be sung by the cantor and musicians while the congregation hums. (You may sing if vaccinated and masked.)

Instructions for in-person worship.

-) Keep your mask on at all times.
-) For hymns, you are invited to pray the words and hum the music.
-) If you are vaccinated, you are safe to sing when wearing a mask.
-) Please keep a social distance of at least six feet from persons not in your same household.
-) Enjoy the presence of one another. As we "speak the peace," wave, smile, make the sign of the Cross. Please do not embrace, hug, kiss, or elbow-bump anyone but for immediate family members you are seated with.
-) In using the restrooms, follow the capacity guidance posted outside the restroom doors. Practice safe hygiene by washing your hands with soap and water before leaving a restroom, and disinfecting your hands using a no-touch disinfectant dispenser located outside the restrooms.
-) Please do not attend worship if you are currently sick with any of the following symptoms: fever, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, nausea, or diarrhea.
-) Please do not attend worship if you had close personal contact with anyone who has been diagnosed or is awaiting test results for COVID-19 in the past 14 days.
-) Notify the Church Office if you receive a positive COVID-19 test result within 7 days of attending a worship service. Your name will be kept anonymous unless required for reporting to the Department of Health.



"At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you."



Apostles' Creed

Prayers of the Church

The italicized portions of the prayers consist of verses from various Psalms.

Why, O Lord, do you stand far off? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble? Our nation is sinking into a pit we have made. In our own net has our foot been caught. We are snared by the work of our own hands. So many mouths are filled with cursing and deceit and oppression and under their tongues lie mischief and iniquity.

Rise up, O Lord! O God, lift up your hand!

Why, O Lord, do you stand far off? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble? Deep in the hearts of wicked [leaders] there is no fear of God. They flatter themselves that their iniquity cannot be found out. The words of their mouth are mischief and deceit and they have ceased to act wisely and do good. Break the arm of the wicked and seek out their wickedness until you find none.

Rise up, O Lord! Deliver us, O our God!

Why, O Lord, do you stand far off? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble? For our days pass away like smoke, our bones burn like a furnace [with illness], our hearts stricken [with fear] wither like grass, our eyes waste away because of grief. So many hunger and thirst that their souls faint within them.

We call on the Lord: O Lord, we pray, save our lives!

O Lord, you do see! Indeed, you note trouble and grief that you may take it into your own hands. Those in need will not always be forgotten, nor the hope of the poor [in life and in spirit] perish forever.

O that we might see some good! Put gladness into our hearts. Let the light of your face shine on us O Lord!

In our distress we call upon the Lord who is worthy to be praised! To our God we cry for help...and he hears our voice, our cries reach his ears. He delivers us! He delights in us! He lights up our darkness! He girds us with strength! He is a shield for all who take refuge in him.

For who is God except the Lord? Who is a rock besides our God? Blessed be the rock and the God of our salvation!

Lord Jesus, you make us into family, make us your own through water and Word in baptism. We celebrate with these siblings in faith your promise of forgiveness and new risen life: Stuart Anderson, Gary Pouley, Jeanne Pouley, and Kim Soeder. Guide them to trust you, to proclaim Jesus through word and action, to care for others and the world you have made, and to work for peace and justice for all.

And, Lord Jesus, we raise our prayers to you for the health, the heartfelt hope for healing, of these among us who long for your tender touch and care: [names of individuals.]

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.


We give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.




