Instructions for in-person worship.

- Notify the Church Office if you receive a positive COVID-19 test result within 7 days of attending a worship service. Your name will be kept anonymous unless required for reporting to the Department of Health.





A reading from the letter to the Ephesians.

Ephesians 3:1-13

This is the reason that I Paul am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles— for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given me for you, and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: that is, the Gentiles have become fellow heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel. Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given me by the working of his power. Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places. This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him. I pray therefore that you may not lose heart over my sufferings for you; they are your glory.







A Letter from Pastor Mike

Partners in the call and ministry of Jesus Christ,

It is with a mix of emotions I share with you that I will conclude my position as one of your interim pastors here at Mountain View Lutheran Church, on Tuesday, August 31, 2021. My final Sunday presiding and sharing God's gracious Word will be Sunday, August 29.

This decision has not come easily, nor is it taken lightly. It has been a privilege and a recurrent joy to have been blessed to serve with you through an intensely challenging and growing time—marked with the loss of your lead pastor, compounded by the complexities wrought by the COVID-19 virus, and filled with the imagining of all that God is calling us to become. Amid unanswered questions, a deep sense of loss, a longing for some semblance of normal, there remains at Mountain View a rich and abiding love which permeates each step we have taken together these past thirteen months. Your love of Christ, of one another, of the ministries you do, and of the challenging questions you ask of yourselves and one another reflect the unbridled Holy Spirit blowing in your hearts.

My decision comes as the result of a series of conversations with Pastor Bri, Pastor Kim, your Church Staff, and Church Council. My thanks to each of them for their openness, honesty, and support in working through this process.

I am an advocate for transparency, especially when it comes to healthy pastor and congregation relationships, and I believe you deserve an answer to the question "Why now?"

When I retired as a military chaplain, I elected to begin Social Security benefits at age 62, not imagining that our Lord, and our Bishop, might have further use of my service. One of the implications of taking Social Security early is that there are annual income limits should one elect to re-enter the workforce. If these limits are exceeded significant financial penalties come into play. I will reach this limit at the end of August.

My return to a fuller state of "retiredness" will also allow me to address some muchneeded self-care disciplines, to be more present in my support of my parents, and to tackle some projects at home before the onset of winter.

Thank you for opening and sharing your hearts and lives with me through this time of transition, healing, and growing! I look forward to joining and celebrating with you as you welcome and install your new lead pastor when that day comes.
