



MATTERS of FAITH

I've served pastoral calls that have ranged from 4 years to 6, 16, 11, and 6. Those calls have been to ministry in parishes, on campus, and for Synod leadership. Each ministry setting has had its own culture of leadership, its own way of doing ministry with others on staff and in the congregation. Each setting has had both positive and not-so-positive aspects.

The trick, the task, is to build on strengths and address growth areas through change. Certainly, if no two snowflakes are alike, no two pastors, no two ministries are alike either.

Change has come to Mountain View (to state the obvious) and with it will come changes to leadership styles and the culture of the congregation. What's worked well before will be built upon. What hasn't worked as well will give way to new.

Call me crazy, but a couple of weeks ago I read an article about Seahawks head coach Pete Carroll and the atmosphere his staff seeks to create in the Seahawks organization. It included these two brief paragraphs.

Call us crazy, but we really believe if you cherish the people in your organization and see them as the unique, extraordinary individuals they are, with all the special things they offer your environment, and you celebrate that, everything about your business, your club, your team is going to be better.

It's really a simple thought, but you do it by loving and caring for the people you have around you. And if you wholly do that...everything about your environment is going to improve. You're going to have more fun, you're going to enjoy it more, it's going to be richer. We hope to share that approach...

And as pastors and staff for Mountain View, we too hope to share that approach as we walk into each new day, with new ways.

The Apostle Paul expressed a similar sentiment when he wrote to the faith communities of Thessalonica:

You need to know, friends, that thanking God over and over for you is not only a pleasure, it's a must. We have to do it. Your faith is growing phenomenally; your love for each other is developing wonderfully. Why it's only right we give thanks. We're so proud of you; you're so steady and determined in your faith despite all the hard times that have come down on you...we pray for you all the time, pray that God will make you fit for what he's called you to be, pray that he'll fill your good ideas and acts of faith with his own energy so that it all amounts to something...grace is behind and through all of this... (2 Thessalonians 1:3ff.)

May this be the faith culture moving towards new days.

Things you need to know:

-) You arrive in your vehicle. You stay in your vehicle for the duration of the service.
- \int The service will be approximately 30 to 35 minutes long.
- When you arrive, you will check-in and be given a worship folder and prepackaged communion kit (wafer/grape juice) for each person in your vehicle.
-) The service will be broadcast live via an FM transmitter, so you will listen to the service on your car radio. The frequency will be printed in your worship folder.
-) There is no sermon. The service is centered around Holy Communion, prayer, and songs.
- / Please bring a mask and be prepared to wear it.
-) If you roll your car windows down and sing, then you will be required to wear a mask while singing. If you sing with your windows up, then you don't need to wear a mask.
-) The buildings will be locked, so plan ahead. Use the restroom at home!
-) In addition to the "Park and Praise" worship service, there will still be a video worship service on Sunday mornings.

Giving for May and June 2020

May and June giving has fallen far under expected giving levels. We entered the month of May nearly even to our approved spending guideline, but as of June 30th, our year-to-date giving was only equivalent to approximately 95% of the spending guideline.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Payroll Protection Program

As you've heard on the news, all businesses small and large are struggling to retain employees and keep operations running at pre-pandemic levels. Your church is no exception. In late May, the Church Council asked me to research and ultimately apply for the Payroll Protection Program under the Federal CARES Act passed by Congress. We applied for the maximum amount allowed under the program to bring back a furloughed employee and fund salaries to return our operations to pre-pandemic levels, as allowed for by the PPP provisions. We were awarded the full amount requested in early July and immediately worked to bring operations and all employees back.

The provisions of the PPP loan allow us to request forgiveness of the entire loan following a minimum period of 8 weeks. We will be applying for complete forgiveness as soon as possible.

Receiving these funds have truly been a blessing, especially during the summer months when our giving is typically lower than expected.

With the uncertainty of whether or not school and in-person worship will resume as normal this fall, our hope is that typical giving patterns triumph over uncertainty and after hearing this call for support, the congregation of MVLC honors their commitment to His church with your dedicated tithing.

Tithing During a Pandemic

In my last letter as Treasurer, I prayed that your faithful giving continues into the summer months knowing full well that tithing typically recedes around the end of June as school lets out and families begin travelling. Historically, giving doesn't pick back up until mid to late fall. However, I don't have to tell any of you that this is not a typical year. As expected, our giving has dropped to summer levels, but unfortunately the drop occurred much sooner than expected in mid-May.

My belief is that as a congregation we are coming to grips with the fact that the COVID-19 coronavirus is not going away anytime soon and that has us feeling anxious, depressed, and angry. We can't physically worship together, visit with one another, and are uncertain of when everything will go back to normal. It also means we are being more cautious and vigilant with our health, safety and our finances.

Like many of you, Aidan and I have put off vacations and life events that we'd typically be planning at this time. We are grateful to have this time together as family, but are also worried and saddened that we are "missing out" on our summer, and, more than likely, our Fall plans.

Aidan and I celebrated our 15th anniversary at home in May and will probably celebrate both of our 40th birthdays in the same spot. Camdon had a drive-by celebration for his 10th "golden" birthday. Retiring after 32 years of teaching last month, my mother's retirement party is currently planned for June 2021. We missed multiple graduations, the births of family and friends' children, and the death of loved ones. I'm sure all of you have a similar story.

I left my job at Boeing in May 2019. The plan was to take the summer of 2019 off and begin looking for a job in the non-profit sector. I was excited, nervous, and eager to move on from my corporate life into a life of service. I took board positions at PLU, the Step by Step Foundation, and most recently at our Mountain View Community Center. I applied for a few jobs and interviewed for two. I believed to have secured one in February of this year with a start date of April 1st. April Fools' Day lived up to its namesake this year. The organization I believed to be going to work for furloughed all of their employees and cancelled all job postings. They are still not operational as of this letter.

STEWARDSHIP

While Aidan and I are not hurting financially, the frustration of not being able to move on and start the next phase of our life is real. Our fall calendars are looking like our typical summer calendar with multiple days empty. School will be completely different this year, government restrictions look like they will continue indefinitely into the fall, and our collection of face masks will continue to grow. The only thing that has remained constant on my calendar is church on Sunday. I know it looks and very much feels different, but its still there every week and that is extremely comforting.

My family is very grateful to those who are working to provide that comfort and know how important it is to continue to play our part.

As I started out in this letter, giving is down more than expected for this time of year. As you'll read in my Treasurer's report (pages 12 and 13), we were awarded the PPP loan through the CARES act to bring us back to pre-pandemic operating levels. This was a blessing, but it definitely doesn't catch us up to the commitments we made as a congregation to support His church. We have much work to do both in and outside of church.

Your benevolence dollars matter now more than ever. While we acknowledge our personal struggles with staying at home, there are those who have been or will be forced into homelessness due to this pandemic, many of whom are currently receiving extra government support that ends in July with no outlook beyond then. While most businesses have reopened, jobs are not returning as fast as had been hoped for and businesses are at risk of shutting down again as virus levels continue to rise. For those in the vulnerable category, the decision to go back to work could be a life and death choice. For those with children, school schedules will dictate job schedules. For many, that choice will be made for them and they'll have to choose the best of two evils.

As a congregation, 17.5% of your tithing goes directly to our benevolence partners to provide housing, food, clothing, mental health support, job training, as well as other programs that support your community and neighbors. Our compassion for the neighbor, for the less fortunate, for those in need is who we are at Mountain View Lutheran Church. We support those who need it the most and today they need your help.

CHURCH IS the SAME...

The Return to Worship team is meeting weekly to make safety plans for return to campus. The team members are: Pastor Mike Greenwalt, Susan Bloomfield, Sonja Dahl, Terry Freed, Barry Johnsrud, Erik Knierim, Diane Nelson, and Keith Wright. Our purpose is to review and make suggestions to the Church Council and staff for safely returning to campus for worship, prayer services, and in-person gatherings. The team is reading recommendations from the local public health departments, Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Washington State Department of Health, and Washington State Governor's office.

Church will be the same as confession is said, forgiveness is rendered, the gospel is preached, and music inspires us. Yet it will be very different as we will have drive-in communion services. We hear frequently that many members miss the hugs, handshakes, passing of the peace, singing, and communion. We need to give up what we long for in the moment to keep ourselves and others safe.

The Church Council and staff are making plans to have a "Park and Praise" drive-in communion service as soon as we can. This worship service with Holy Communion is expected to last 30-35 minutes. Everyone will remain in their cars. The church is purchasing a FM radio transmitter. We will have the opportunity to gather together in our cars, enjoy a live worship service, and participate in communion. The communion will be handed out at the entrance and you will be expected to wait until the appropriate time to partake in communion. The communion wafer and grape juice will come in a package or we will ask that you bring your own grape juice in a box and bread.





... YET DIFFERENT





The team is also working on an in-person Prayer Open House in order to offer the opportunity be in the Sanctuary for prayer. You will be expected to wear a mask and keep six feet distance between non-household members. We will have music playing in the background. You are encouraged to bring your own Bibles as all the hymnals and Bibles are removed from the seats.

The Sanctuary seats are grouped together in family seating. People from the same household may sit together. While it may be tempting to hug, please keep six feet distance to keep everyone safe. You can wave, "air high-five," smile, or bow.

The church is reviewing the extra cleaning plans and will be purchasing an electrostatic sprayer. This will help the custodian sanitize large areas at one time. Extra attention will be given to high touch areas. You will be encouraged to wash your hands or use hand sanitizer upon entering the church building. In the beginning, the Gathering Space doors will be the entrance point.

The two churches that rent the chapel have very small membership. They will be able to gather sooner than our larger congregation. All of us must follow rules to keep everyone safe: wearing a mask, keeping six feet between non-household members, no group singing, and no shared food.

PEACE and JUSTICE

The Mountain View Peace and Justice Ministry Group focuses on how we can show love and mercy to our neighbors. It can be simple steps: purchasing fair trade coffee, tea, and chocolate; or writing a letter to your congressperson; or bringing a can of food for the food bank. We also provide a community meal on the fifth Monday of the month (at the Puyallup Armory) in partnership with St. Francis House, as well as other volunteer opportunities throughout the year. Some of these things are now made more complex by the pandemic, and our need for social distance.

COVID-19 is not simply something that prevents us from gathering: for many people it is sending their world into a tailspin of hunger and poverty. One of our favorite organizations, Bread for the World, has initiated a letter writing campaign, urging congress to do more to help. This is something you can do from your home **today**. Simply go to www.bread.org to learn more about the issue. You can email or call your congress person today, if you wish.

We meet each month (second Tuesday of each month, meetings are currently via Zoom). Each year we pick a book to read and discuss as we work to recognize issues, educate ourselves, and provide information to our fellow congregation members on a variety of topics including fair trade, hunger, poverty, sexism and racism. DEACONS

I have been asked to give you an update on the Deacon Ministry. You haven't seen us since we were last sent to take communion on Sunday, March 8, 2020. You might not see us, but we are still serving out our call to care for our church family.

The first place we see deacons in the New Testament is in the sixth chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. The church leadership, the twelve, were very busy praying and teaching and preaching the word of God and found it difficult to meet the daily essential needs of the faith community. The original intent was to make sure the widows had food. They needed help doing this. This help came from within the faith community, the body of Christ. As the church grew, the work and responsibilities of these committed members grew beyond their original assignment until they were serving their faith community in a variety of way.

Our deacon program has done the same. Originally our task was to take communion to members who were sick, shut in, or lonely. In the serving of communion, they were fed with bread and wine, text and prayer. In the midst of these difficult days we can no longer do that, but as in the New Testament, our tasks have also grown. Cards are still being sent on a regular basis as requested by the office. Prayer shawls are being creatively delivered in regard to social distancing as requested by the office. Grief Group grieves the inability to gather together. Much of our healing is done with a hug or a hand held during difficult conversations. But we continue to communicate with each other through cards, and calls and electronic messages. We continue to be a presence to one another.

In light of the pandemic, there is one particular group of deacons that has been doing a lot of work. We began a new ministry with extended training in February 2019. This group was called the Congregational Care Ministry and we were asked to extend our deacon ministry beyond the sharing of Eucharist to a more extended coverage for our members. We were scheduled to be available to make visits and or calls to members when both pastors were unable to cover all of the congregational care situations. Pastors were always the first call and we did the follow up calls. This was first put to use during Pastor John's sabbatical.

DEACONS

Due to the absence of both Pastor John and Pastor Bri, this group of fourteen was really put to use. They were called to a grief situation the day after Pastor John's resignation and continued to actually be the night time emergency number on the church phone until Pastor Kim joined us on July 1. It is with great relief that Pastor Kim is now with us to care for our church family. The deacons can all sleep through the night now. It is Pastor Kim who gets those night time calls. At one point since Pastor Kim's arrival, we discussed whether this group could be taken off their weekly schedule and the calls and contacts be totally turned over to him. When I asked for their thoughts on this, I read over and over again the word "blessed" in the deacon reports. "I was so blessed by my conversation with this member." "I received multiple blessings from my visits this week." "I sincerely feel we are called to continue this ministry as a back up to the work that Pastor Kim will do. It was a blessing to me to be involved in these member's lives." And so we plan to carry on and continue our work.

As an entire group, the Deacons also participate in Conversation Partners. They specifically have one person or family that they keep in touch with on a regular basis. This is usually members who are in a care facility or shut in or alone or lonely. In these difficult times this could be any and all of us. The deacons have been asked to extend their conversations beyond their assigned partners to include others. As the caring congregation that we are, all of the ministry groups have been trying to do this as well. I sincerely encourage all who read this today to go to the directory and pick another member to contact. Make a phone call, send a card, reach out to someone you always sat close to at church. Find out how they are doing. The deacons are a body of 28 folks, but think of the outreach to one another that could be done if each and every one of you made one or two random calls throughout the week. In Pastor Glenn's words from a sermon on May 3, "Even as we hunker down at the time of pandemic, we do not hide. We are engaged in God's healing word." We do not hide. The deacons are "out there." We are engaged in God's work and we encourage you to do the same. Reach out and touch your neighbor, not their physical body, but their hearts, and you too will be blessed.

MEN'S BIBLE STUDY

I know that I speak for each of the other members of the Men's Bible Study group when I extend an invitation to all of the men that might be reading this newsletter to join us by way of the Zoom conference. We meet online every Saturday from 7:30 – 9:00 am. Our online Zoom conference may be joined prior to 7:30am; it is available from 7:00 – 9:15am.


Books, bikes, hikes, movies, gardening, family and friends all make up their main focus.



Verizon Cell Tower Update

Just a quick update on the Verizon Cell Phone Tower project. Verizon's contractor, Tilson Tech, held a neighborhood WebEx (online) meeting, for those with properties within 300 feet of the Mountain View Campus, on Wednesday, June 10. About a dozen people attended, out of 30 potential neighbors. Positive responses were received during this meeting. The official zoning application and State Environmental Protection Act process is now underway. You may see a "Public Notice" sign on 122nd Avenue near the Chapel in the coming days, to indicate that this process has started. Once the public comment period has closed, Mountain View will receive a revised lease for our legal counsel to review. Once the lease is signed, permits can be issued, and construction planning and construction will commence!

Online Worship

You may have noticed that we are now using a professional videographer to complete our weekly online worship. Due to the many new responsibilities during the Pastoral Transition and "Return to Worship" preparation, Mountain View has retained the services of Creative 24 Media (a videographer used by Mountain View Community Center), to produce our weekly worship video. We provided them with extensive documentation and job shadowing, a couple of months ago, and they have done a marvelous job to quickly learn and assume this vital weekly role! Creative 24 also has multiple people who are familiar with our worship setup, so that we have back-up coverage in the event of vacations or illness. Currently, this cost is partially offset by the reduced monthly cost of office & custodial supplies, and the not needing to pay for nursery care on a weekly basis.

Marlene continues to provide the overlay text for the video editing process, and Troy continues to provide the weekly worship folder that is available in PDF format on the Mountain View website each week!
