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MATTERS of FAITH

Martin Luther was convinced that government was a gift from God; that good government was a blessing; that Christians needed to be educated in order to serve well in government. Luther believed that government is responsible to God and its' primary role is to contain and punish evil, maintain peace and good order, and work to ensure that no person goes hungry or is need of basic and necessary goods and services.

To move government in that direction, Luther and his supporters started a community chest that collected money from business and government leaders, a well as a tax upon the rich. From that chest of money, the poor were fed and clothed and offered interest free loans. Money from that chest was also used to bring medical care to the poor at no cost to them. They started the public school system to offer education to all students and not simply the wealthy. And they offered education to girls and women so that at one time, girls made up half the number of students in school. These ministries spread in popularity and use throughout Europe and formed the foundation of modern European health and education systems to this day. Governments embraced these social efforts.

Luther also taught that we are to pray for our leaders, support them when they do right for the common good, and challenge and criticize them when they fail to carry out their God-given duties. And when their policies seek to do things that harm such a mandate, we are to disobey them.

Social welfare. Social services. Free and universal health care. Public schools for all instead of private schools for the few and wealthy. Low-cost subsidized business and education loans for the poor. Government that serves the common good not just the powerful or wealthy few. A church engaged in the world for good.

Do these teachings and actions fit with your understanding of faithfulness to the gospel? Do they motivate you to speak up, act out, serve the common good? Will they lead to an examination of your support of politicians and political parties?

If so, you are a Lutheran Christian. If not, just who are you?

What's been happening in Rock Ministry?

One of the great disadvantages of not meeting on-site at the church is that we don't get to see all our children and youth and the ways they are active in faith right now. Even though you haven't seen them, ministry with our children and youth has continued through all the challenges and changes of COVID.

Highlights of Ministry from Fall 2020.

All children and youth had Back To School Kits delivered with a devotion and goodies in September. High school youth had fresh donuts & a devotion delivered to their doorstep on the first day of school.

We had lots of campfires! Both Middle Rock (5th-7th grades) and High School Youth took advantage of the new fire pit, with time for devotions and outdoor games.

Middle Rock meet in-person in small groups of 5 up until late November when Covid precautions increased. We also had an online-version small group for youth who weren't able to meet in person. Surprisingly, we've had better participation from this age-group during Covid times than prior. Almost the whole roster has been frequently active, so we find ourselves with the very good challenge of pin-pointing what has been working so well!

Children ages 2 through 4th grade received weekly "Mt. View Epistles" in the mail with a devotion based on the lectionary epistle. They also received a special craft packet for the Festival of All Saints, as well as a special craft packet for the week of Christmas. A Jesse Tree Advent daily devotion was also sent to all these families.

In December, church members made cookies for our youth, which were then delivered along with decorating supplies. Children from 2nd grade up through High School gathered in online Zoom sessions with their Rock Ministry mentors to decorate these cookies and enjoy each other's company.

Several inter-generational small groups were formed to support our 'younger' moms during this stressful time in their lives. These groups consist of 2-3 young moms and 2 'wise women' of the congregation. The small groups engaged in conversation, faith-based reflection and vespers worship together.

What is happening in Winter/Spring 2021.

Children Age 2 through 4th grade: 22 families are receiving weekly devotions (usually based on a lectionary reading for the week). Sam and Cindy Jones have been helping adapt Godly Play materials (usually used on Sunday mornings) so that they are easy for families to use at home. Families also receive a 'family check-in' page with news, photos and updates from one of our MVLC families.

Each family also received a "home altar" kit that has a liturgical cloth (sewn by MVLC members Joan Linden and Marie Philipsen), a candle and other devotional tools. *COVID times have been a reminder that faith practiced in the home is as important as faith expressed in communal worship; we hope to equip our families to do so.*

Youth from 5th – 7th grade continue to gather for weekly Zoom Youth Group with devotions, prayer and time for fellowship/games. In January we began a lesson series on being made in the image of God. The lessons are part of the curriculum that Mountain View members wrote about 10 years ago when Rock Ministry was established. This curriculum hasn't been used for some time but is very good content. The image of God lessons are also age appropriate to the 'tween' stage of changing bodies, changing friendships, and changing perceptions of their identity.

High school youth from $8^{th} - 12^{th}$ grades will have occasional Zoom gatherings for check in, devotion and prayer. Our emphasis is equally on connecting the youth beyond technology, particularly in 1-on-1 relationships: youth to youth and MVLC adults/mentors to youth.

Our winter focus will be on what it means to be people of "good news" to one another. We are encouraging the youth to support and build up one another with intentional Acts of Kindness.

Once small group in-person gatherings are possible, we'll gather the youth for as many outdoor activities as possible, as these have been a highlight.

How can you help?

Stamps. We need more stamps for weekly mailings to families! Each week we send out 22 letters or packets for our children's ministry. Stamps can be mailed to the church or dropped off at the office Monday through Thursday, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Home Deliveries. We frequently need drivers to drop off special kits at children's and youths' houses. These can be no-contact deliveries—safe for anyone to do. You just need to be comfortable navigating to new addresses. Contact Pastor Bri if you are available to help.

To honor the tradition of Lenten soup suppers, members will be provided recipes for preparing soup at home for each Wednesday in Lent. Two unique recipes will be available each week, one of them vegetarian. Members are encouraged to make and eat the chosen soup at home prior to the worship at 7:00 p.m.

We remain in a less-than-normal time, hungering for normalcy and community. Our hope and prayers are that we will be strengthened by this 2021 season of reflection and renewal, together in worship and prayer.
